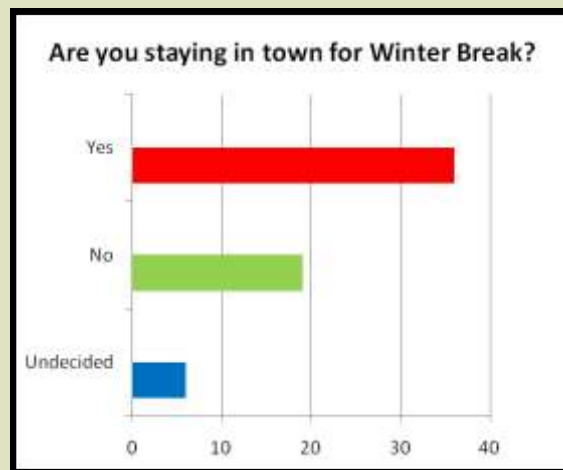
When you look closely at their apparel and footwear, you can tell that both of these companies make very high quality products. Which would you choose?

Have you seen this exhibit yet?

The **"Bodies"** exhibit was cool, very educational, and just plain interesting. It explains a lot about human anatomy by using more than 200 actual preserved human bodies and specimens that show how different body systems work.

The first people to learn about human anatomy were the Egyptians. They figured out a lot about anatomy through their mummification process.

As soon as you walk into the exhibit, you see a gift shop to your right. After you pay the admission charge (\$22 for adults, \$14 for children 4-12), you walk into a hallway. Miss O'Bannon (who sometimes substitute teaches Social Studies for Mrs. Maxey) was there. She took my family's picture against a green screen.

Then you get to the main part of the exhibit. They have human bodies with the muscles, veins, organs, and bones removed so you can see all the different parts.

At first, you enter a room with parts of legs, feet, and sections of brains.

The next room is my favorite because it shows just the veins. On the wall it says the veins in one human body can go around the world twice!

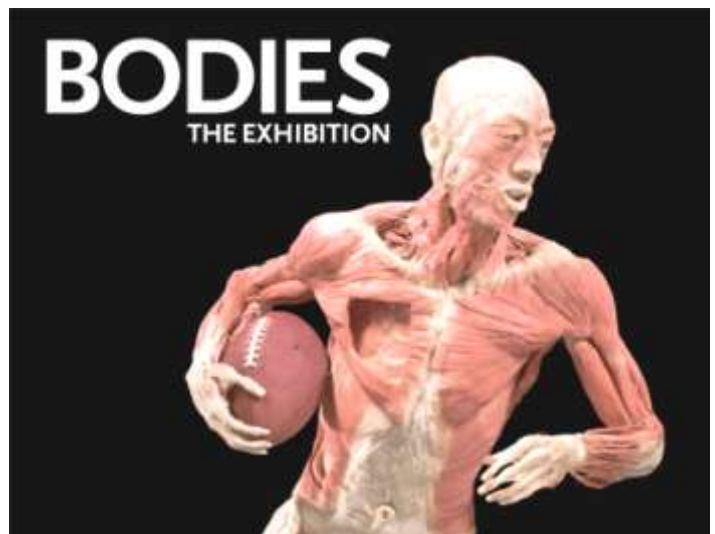
Several other Riverfield Middle School students have seen the exhibit. Nicholas Hartman said, **"When I was there, I enjoyed the wide array of medical specimens."**

Stephen Holland also liked the exhibit. **"I thought it was very interesting how they cut them**

open and dissected the brains to see what was inside," he said.

Fun facts about dinosaurs

Here are some interesting facts about dinosaurs. The first dinosaurs were small meat-eating dinosaurs that lived 200 million years ago.

Did you know that Oklahoma has a state fossil? It is the Saurophaganax. You can still see dinosaur foot prints in the sandstone in a few places.

The Tyrannosaurus Rex was 37 feet long and about as tall as a giraffe. The name Tyrannosaurus Rex means tyrant lizard. He had 60 razor sharp teeth, some longer than a human hand. Tyrannosaurus Rex was so big he probably would have crushed his head if he tripped.

T-Rex was a carnivore, a meat eater. He might have been a scavenger because his arms were too weak to be of much use, and his legs could

not have run fast enough to hunt well. He probably could have run about 20 miles per hour. A Tyrannosaurus Rex fossil named Sue was the most complete T-Rex ever found. She sold at auction for \$8,362,500.

Then there was Tricera-

tops. He was about 30 feet long. He had one small horn on his nose and two longer horns near the top of his head about the size of hockey sticks. The horns were mostly for protection because Triceratops was an herbivore, or plant eater.

Carnivorous dinosaurs usually had large teeth, sharp claws, good eyes, and fast legs. Carnivores had larger brains than herbivores because hunting takes more thinking capacity than wandering around all day eating plants.

Some herbivorous dinosaurs swallowed stones to help them grind up tough plants. Some reptiles and birds still do this today.

Nobody really knows why the dinosaurs died out. A meteor could have crashed into the Earth, or they could have frozen to death at the start of an Ice Age.

Or, they could have suffocated. Research shows that 67 million years ago there was 38% air, and 2 million years later the percentage shrank to 28%.

I hope you learned a few new things about dinosaurs.

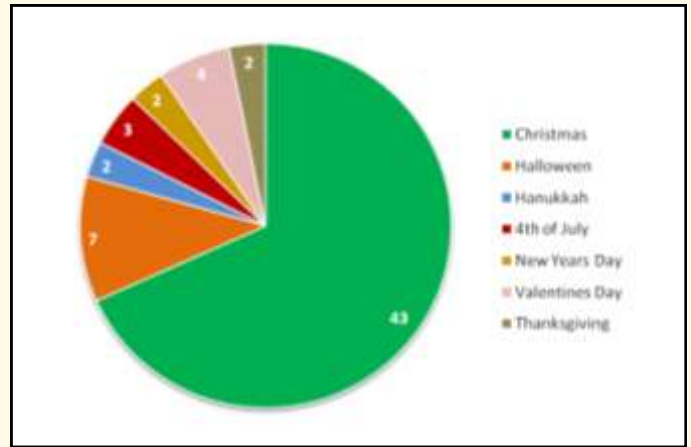

Braum's Ice Cream and Dairy Stores

After getting some thoughtful answers from Drew, I decided to treat him to Braum's for all his hard work.

But before we talk about that, let's learn a little about the history of Braum's.

Bill Braum began his career in 1933 working with his father in a small milk and butter processing plant in Emporia, Kansas. Bill worked there through high school, and then went to the University of Kansas where he earned a Business Administration degree.

After college, Braum went back to the family business where he decided he would specialize in ice cream. He

sold the wholesale part of the business in 1952, and then started a chain of stores called Peter Pan Ice Cream.

When he sold the chain to a large wholesaler in 1967, one of the conditions of the sale was that he could not sell ice cream in the state of Kansas for ten years. So the next year, Bill opened "Braum's Ice Cream and Dairy Stores" in Oklahoma.

Since then, the company has grown into the large chain it is today, with over 280 stores across Oklahoma, Texas, Missouri, Arkansas ...

and yes, Kansas.

So now that you know its history, let's get back to the restaurant today.

Instead of just ice cream, Braum's sells everything from hamburgers to cereal. While there, Drew and I noticed they have a small grocery, a full fast food menu, and Grade A ice cream.

I ordered a quarter pound hamburger, a chocolate chip mint ice cream cone, and a Dr Pepper, and Drew ordered "a number ten" which is a junior burger and some fries.

While I waited in line for less than five minutes, I looked around the place. It may not have the atmosphere of an expensive restaurant,

with parts of the floor being slick, but for the price it was well worth it. The ice cream is from Braum's own manufacturing plant, and it

is some of the best ice cream in the world.

When you add all these things together, you can see why the restaurant has continued to grow and flourish over the years.

Braum's is, without a doubt, one of the best ice cream choices on the market today. With so much to choose from, it's the best choice for anyone's craving for ice cream.

Lamborghini Gallardo vs. Ferrari 458

Many know that Lamborghini and Ferrari have been fighting for top dominance in the luxury Italian sports car market. But many people have never been able to decide which one is the best. So let's compare and contrast two models.

Let's start out with the Lamborghini Gallardo. The Gallardo was made in 2003. With a starting price of \$200,000, it is one of the highest priced sports cars in the world. The Gallardo can do 202

Breakdancing battles

In breakdancing, “battles” are dance competitions in which two breakers or a crew of dancers show off their skills.

There are two different kinds of battles.

One is a cypher battle. That means a dancer gets in the center of a circle (which is usually mixed with breakers and casual onlookers) and breakdances. The breakers usually dance freestyle. Also, there are no judges,
