iverfield 2023 graduates were the first graduating class to walk across the stage in the newly renovated Clark Gymnasium. With family, friends, and RCDS faculty and staff surrounding the 29 graduates, they celebrated the end of their school years at the Upper School Commencement Exercises on Friday, May 19.

Jack Thomas was selected by his peers to address his class at the ceremony. "I like to think of Riverfield as its own oceanic ecosystem. A successful ecosystem produces a unique scale of harmonious biodiversity," Thomas said in his opening. He went on to compare magnificent creatures of the ocean to his classmates and teachers, all with a nod to how they are part of the symbiotic relationships that make the whole. For example, he said, "I like to think of Mrs. Coutant as a powerful, glowing moon, controlling the tide with her gentle pull." In the end of his captivating speech, Thomas encouraged his fellow classmates, "The ocean may be turbulent on some days and smooth as glass on others. Overall, THIS [Riverfield] ecosystem has taught us how to thrive, sometimes in an unforgiving environment. Without all the moving parts, an ecosystem cannot be excellent. It will not reach its full potential. So, remember, wherever the current may take you, never forget to JUST... KEEP... SWIMMING."

Daniel Hodges was chosen as the faculty speaker by the Class of 2023. Affectionately known as "Hodges," he spoke of his pride for the student body and shared sage advice and words of wisdom, leaving the graduation class with this: "Your generation has many challenges ahead, but I, for one, and all of us here tonight have confidence you can make the world a better place, not just for yourselves, but for humanity."





After being down 2-0 at halftime, the Lady Ravens came back and the score was 3-3 at the final whistle, pushing the game into overtime. Nya Barnard's Golden Goal

(the first goal scored in overtime) won the game! The Lady Ravens finished the season strong and qualified for the 3A State Playoffs. In May, the entire Varsity Girls Soccer team and Upper School student body cheered on Calla Andrews as she signed her Letter of Intent to play college Soccer with Washington and Lee University in Virginia.

Both Varsity Teams had successful seasons with tournament victories at Pauls Valley, Regent, Henryetta, Stillwater, and Riverfield.

The Varsity Girls played the state tournament at the 5A classification for the first time due to success in recent years, despite being one of the smallest schools playing tennis in Oklahoma. The entire team qualified for state finishing 2nd at Regionals. At state, all entries won matches. Kennedy Patterson and Katie Smith (#2 Doubles), Amelia Anderson and Reese Covey finished 8th (#1 Doubles), Maureen Sellers was on the podium finishing 5th (#2 Singles), and freshman Lily Clark (#1 Singles) won the first state championship in Girls Ravens Tennis history.

The Varsity Boys swept the 4A Regional Tournament winning every flight. At State, **Kaleb Chesher** (#1 Singles) finished 6th. **Trey Pope** (#2 Singles) won multiple "marathon" matches and finished 3rd. **Johnson Hale** and **Caleb Walton** (#1 Doubles) finished 4th. **Jake Bell** and **Quinn Steenson** (#2 Doubles) were State Champions becoming the first Ravens Tennis doubles team to ever win State. Overall, the Boys team finished 2nd at State and will join the Girls team in the 5A class next year.

The Middle School Tennis teams were lean in numbers but worked hard all year. They improved throughout the season and gained a lot of experience. The girls were led by **Sophia Diaz**, **Kara Flinton**, **Evie Fowler**, **Zoe Jackson**, **Nicya Moore**, and **Rylyn Williams**. The boys team included **John Brown**, Ethan Chesher, Wynn Dorwart, Alex Gund, Evan **McCartney**, **Cole Patterson**, **Harry Phariss** and **Kenyon Williams**.

In postseason news, senior **Kaleb Chesher** was named All State and will play in the All State games in July. **Lily Clark** is a finalist for the *Tulsa World* Player of the Year in Girls Tennis.





Celebrating Trees!

RCDS 4th/5th grade classes, aptly named after trees, focused their studies in '22-23 on Tree Advocacy. Specifically, their Investigative Project centered on Tulsa Celebri-Trees: Trees that qualify (or once qualified) as Champion Trees and/or hold historic significance in the Tulsa community. Students formed committees based on their curiosities and interests, from marketing and graphic design to judiciary investigation, playwriting, hiking and geocaching. One group of students interviewed representatives from the Tennessee Champion Tree Program, while another created a <u>documentary</u> featuring **Clayton Coss**, a Tulsa Chainsaw Artist, who is creating furniture for Riverfield's new Center for Creativity from campus trees lost amid its construction. In celebration of Arbor Day, all committees came together to plant 15 trees at Aaronson Park, where they were featured on Fox 23, Channel 8, and News on 6. In combination with Riverfield's Spring

Expo, this year-long study of trees culminated in a student-written and led mock trial at the courthouse with **Judge Christine Little**. Through combined efforts of multiple groups throughout the year, a website, social media presence, maps and brochures were created and continue to bring awareness to the Tulsa community about the Celebri-trees in their midst. A tiny frog enjoying the previous year's project, Black Shadow River, was the jumping off point for the '22-23 2nd/3rd grade Creek and Lakes class's design doing project. It all started as they began exploring the class-made river and a little frog hopped out. That spark of inspiration led to the creation of Frog City. First, by watching footage of a nature cam, the students wanted to learn what critters did when humans were not around. Like the scientists they are, the class began collecting data.

In the Lower School, the question of what makes for a thriving community and happy citizens was a common thread. Students focused in on important concepts such as the basic needs for survival, the differences between residential and commercial properties, and the wants of a culturally vibrant community, such as schools and art. **Elina Uddin** and her best friend **Lily Krefft** were on the team to create characters and develop their stories, a "comfortable" task as these two have been writing "The Adventures of Ann & Coco," featuring them as pandas,

since the 2nd grade at RCDS.

"Writing about frog life was a little different because we had to learn what they ate and what they liked to do," Elina said. Along with their classmates, they brought their characters to life with modeling clay. Johnny Boy was super buff, with big muscly arms.

Jimmy was an artist and his partner, Jade, ran a business from home. Lily's favorite character was Froggert-Williams who is the local museum owner and lived in the hotel. "I just needed to create Froggert because he loves art like I do," Lily said.


This cast of characters needed spaces to enjoy life and the second semester kicked off the construction of Frog City, located on both sides of Black Shadow River just outside Lower School teacher **Terri Naifeh's** door. "These students put their academic and problem solving skills into practice as they built Frog City from the ground up," Mrs. Naifeh said. Learning from a City Planner in Bixby, they divided their city into zones, prioritized which buildings needed to be built first, and worked together to determine the best layout and location for each one, including an airport, museum, schools, and even a sushi restaurant.

Izzy Walker was partnered with Hazel Haney to create the

Elementary school of Frog City. "We made it two stories tall to fit all the grades and our colors were Blue and Green," Izzy said. The Middle and Upper Schools represented the same colors, in honor of Riverfield. After building models with paper and laying out the city, construction using the Glow Forge, glue, and paint began. Frog City paired with a video, research materials, and books were on full display at the Spring Expo.

They found that the peacocks really enjoyed the broccoli seedlings so none of them survived to harvest, but the rest grew very well. The students celebrated on the last day of class with fresh-grown salads and a new appreciation

In addition to the garden, students were also able to seed lots of milkweed and native wildflower plants that have been added to pollinator gardens around the Middle School.

"The Roots & Shoots program is a great way to inspire students to make a positive difference in the world around them," Middle School teacher **Rachel Langley** said.

From Winter to Spring: From little seeds grow mighty trees


Infants at Riverfield are invited to explore and investigate nature with each passing season. Like in nature, there is ongoing growth and changes. Our infants also grow, change, and develop with the space of time. "With this parallel concept of growth and change, we explored the winter and spring season's unique phenomena and embraced each of our infant's growth and development throughout the school year," Bird teacher Rachel Richardson said. The Bird Class studied the transition of the seasons using a variety of materials. The children held and shaped grey clay to represent grey, rainy days. A small group of students particularly interested in *The Nutcracker* chose parts, designed costumes and invitations, selected a musical score and practiced dances before putting on a very special performance for the Woods Class. This stellar performance inspired the rest of the class to continue investigating, 'What makes a performance?'

Inspired by fairytales, students wrote and illustrated stories that incorporated components of Riverfield and its community. They shared their stories with one another and voted on their top creative favorites: The Tale of the Three Little Peacocks and the Big Bad Mr. Bates, Puss in Boots, Silveree and the Three Birds, and The Tale of the Little Chick. As they worked in committees throughout the semester to bring the four stories to life, students continued their research by attending a variety of puppet shows, *La Cincineta*, Tulsa Opera, and the Lyric Theater's interactive Oklahoma!

Noticing that performances have a special way of bringing people together, the children wondered how they could create a space at Riverfield to do just that with their four shows. Their research turned toward stages as they designed, measured, and created blueprints of what a shared performance space could look like for the Riverfield community.

Working together with Jerry Bates, Jack Maxey, and Katie Musick, the stage they'd imagined became a reality! By Spring Expo, Sky Class students had assigned roles, practiced lines, chosen music, designed and created costumes, invitations, and a program. Parents, teachers and friends filled the audience as they debuted their original performances on their very own stage, now a permanent structure on the Riverfield grounds. Bravo, Sky Class!

National Placement in Cyber News



National CyberStart Semi-finalists

In the National CyberStart America security challenge, students take on the role of a cyber detective intern working on cybersecurity tasks and simulations built by an expert team of professionals based on real-world scenarios.

Five RCDS students; **Xavier Messenger**, 9th, **Hogan Hulsey**, 10th, **Emma England**, 11th, **Alex Silman**, 11th, and **Ishan Patel**, 12th, were semi-finalists in the competition. Emma and Xavier were two of the top scoring finalists in the nation, advancing to apply for exclusive scholarships. Xavier advanced on to receive the National Cyber Scholar status from the National Cyber Scholarship Foundation, earning him access to free SANS training at the Cyber Foundations Academy, a \$3,000 value.

Riverfield, as a school, earned a Cyber Opportunity School digital Bronze Award.

eSports Takes Off

Upper School '22-23 Ravens represented as the first eSports class coached by **Paul Knight**, competing against OSSAA schools in Oklahoma. A four-person team chooses their gaming characters—such as Mario, Princess Peach, Donkey Kong, and Bowser—allowing players to virtually race around tracks in interactive spaces in Mario Kart.

Four teams used strategy and skill to smash the competitors in Smash Brothers. Outside of competitions, all teams scrimmaged against competitors across the nation.




Another Year of Rock

Utopian Society

What makes a "happy" community? Grasslands, Lakes, and Meadow 2nd/3rd graders took a deep dive this year into the question, pooled their findings, and collaborated to create their own utopian society.

Students researched and presented on what makes certain areas of the world "happier" places to live than others. Costa Rica was ultimately chosen as the model country because of its temperate climate, lush rainforest, and laid-back way of living. Zooming in on the ideas Costa Rica inspired, students tracked their own day-to-day happiness with a ladder scaled "best to worst." They recorded ideas that might help move them closer to the "best" rung, and repeated the process with their parents and families. After pooling their data, students determined five distinct categories that affected ratings: entertainment, health, nature, relationships, and pets/animals. With these categories in mind, students began crafting a world zoned into commercial, agricultural, and residential areas, integrating math through the concepts of perimeter, area, measurement, and scale.

They also partnered with the Upper School yearbook class to create a digital photo essay documenting happiness in the Riverfield community, paired with a curated playlist of "happy music" from **Libby Sublett's** class. The Happiness Project inspired students in the areas of research, critical thinking, math, literacy, science, civics, and social emotional learning. Certainly, the 2nd/3rd grade wing is a happy place!

Speech & Debate



This was another year of excellence for Ravens Speech and Debate. From November to April, 24 Upper School students competed in a competition schedule that included eight qualifying and three post-season tournaments. The team earned a school-record of 40 qualifying events for the Regional Tournament in March, took home the Regional Championship, then held off all challengers to win a sixth consecutive State Championship! "It all starts with having amazing, fierce students who are hard-working, creative, and resilient," **Coach David Wright** said. Additionally, with a cumulative GPA of 3.94, this Raven squad was recognized as the 3A State Champion for Distinguished Academic Achievement.

Following this record-breaking season, team members **Trey Pope, Holden Williams**, and **Jackson Baker** traveled to Phoenix, AZ in mid-June to represent RCDS and East Oklahoma at the NSDA National Speech and Debate Tournament. Holden's father, **Dr. Dixon Williams** traveled with the Raven contingent and said, "Reportedly, this is the biggest academic tournament in the world. Our small (but beloved) team competed with giant schools from all over America. It truly was an amazing experience."



The Advanced Environmental Science class, taught by the Upper School teacher **James Wilson**, has participated in the Trout in the Classroom program with Trout Unlimited for several years. "Each Halloween we receive around 300 rainbow trout eggs from a fish hatchery in Montana," Wilson said. "The students observe and care for the trout throughout their development. Each spring we release the mature fish into the Lower Illinois River with a group of volunteers." While on

their trout-releasing excursion, students also learn to tie flies, cast a fly rod, and identify macroinvertebrates in the stream.

Class of '23 senior **Nya Barnard** enjoyed Wilson's Environmental Science class so much as a junior, she elected to continue learning with him in Anatomy her senior year. "I like Mr. Wilson's class because of his fun approach to teaching and the projects we complete. He is really fun and silly, so that makes it even more enjoyable," she said.



Representing Riverfield's approach to learning in Pre-School, Jen Kesslering, Pre-School Division Head, and Whitney Dickinson, Pre-School Coordinator, presented on the topic of Children in Nature at the World Forum Foundation in May. The annual conference hosted more than 500 Early Childhood Educators from 50 countries. It is an honor that the work of Riverfield was featured and continues to inspire other educators to learn from the Reggio-Amelia approach in early childhood.

Rachel Langley, Middle School Science teacher, explored the greater limits at the Space Exploration NASA Educators Conference in February. 
